This Reading Comprehension activity will help
 your child to practise their reading skills. Start with the one-star questions and work up to the two or three-star ones if your child is ready.


Check your child's understanding of the main events in the story with this Sequencing Activity. Can they put the events in the correct order?


Set your child a reading challenge! Colour in an animal for each book they read. Once all the animals on the Reading Log are coloured, you could decide on a reward for their hard work!

## Maths



This Maths Activity Booklet will keep children busy trying to solve the mystery of the missing marigolds! The booklet contains word problems featuring addition, subtraction, repeating patterns, measurement and number bonds to 20. What a fun way to reinforce your child's learning!

The animals in the story follow footprints to the monster's cave. Draw around your child's feet and make some monster footprints! Cut them out and write numbers on the footprints to help your child practise counting in twos.


It's springtime in the wood of Little Nook! Use these Maths Mosaics as a fun way to practise children's multiplication skills. When your child has solved all of the multiplications, they'll reveal the hidden pictures!
