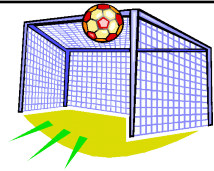
Fronted Adverbials

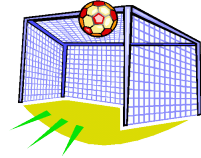
Fronted Adverbials
