We join our clauses together using conjunctions.

The word and is a conjunction.


Joining Sentences


We often want to join our clauses together to make our writing more interesting to read. When we do this we use conjunctions.


When we are joining two clauses that are as important as each other and that could be individual sentences, we use a **co-ordinating conjunction**.

There are many **co-ordinating conjunctions** but we are going to look more carefully at three of them:

Joining Sentences	
Each of these co-ordinating conjunctions has a different job.	
and	is used when we are adding more information to a sentence.
but	is used when we are contrasting things.
or	is used when we are writing about alternatives.








Look at the clause below. Which of our 3 co-ordinating conjunctions would join these together best?
