How and why do we assess children?



Statutory formal assessments throughout school.

- Reception Baseline Assessment
- Phonics Screening Check - Year 1
- End of KS1 Assessments (now optional)
- Multiplication Tables Check (Year 4)
- End of KS2 Assessments (Year 6)

These are assessments that we have to make our children complete and the results are sent to the DFE.

How and why do we assess children?



So we know what knowledge and skills our children have retained and what they still need to know!

How and why do we assess children?



Assessment for Learning (AFL)

Formative AFL

This is the ongoing assessment from the teacher during lessons. The teacher will be constantly assessing how a child is doing through conversations and working with the child as well as when marking books.

How might this look in books?



A yellow highlighted sticker means the child has met the objective of the lesson.

MC

If a child has met the objective, they may be given an MC (mastery challenge) which will challenge the child further.

How might this look in books?



A blue highlighted sticker means the child has not yet met the objective of the lesson.

IC

If a child hasn't met the objective, they may be given an IC (improvement challenge) which will aim to fill in any gaps in knowledge that would then allow them to improve further.

Same Day Intervention

In maths, if a gap in a child's knowledge is identified within a lesson then they may go in to same day intervention.




Practical Application

Summative Assessment



Summative assessment is the use of more formal tests to determine where a child is 'at'.

In Year 6 we use summative assessments half-termly.

Why?

Allows teachers to identify prior knowledge quickly.

Allows pupils to become familiar with the layout, wording and conditions that the 'real' SATs puts them under.

We want them to be as stress-free as possible.

End of Key Stage 2 Assessments (SATs)

11th May - SPaG Paper 1 (45 min)

- Spelling Paper

12th May - Reading Paper (1 hour)

13th May - Maths Paper 1 (Arithmetic - 30 min)

- Maths Paper 2 (Reasoning - 40 min)

14th May - Maths Paper 3 (Reasoning - 40 min)

Frequently Asked Questions



Why do they not do a writing SATs test?

Writing is teacher assessed. Over the course of Year 6 we complete many writes and we submit our teacher assessment for this.

Can you change the day they do their SATs?

Unfortunately not, all schools must complete them on the same day unless there are exceptional circumstances.

Can the children ask for help?

We cannot help the children to answer the questions; however, we can read questions to them (not in the reading paper).
